


Big Band - many swing jazz orchestras travelled the country

- played mostly for dances (cheap entertainment during Depression)

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New Deal - Works Project Administration (WPA)

Artists, Musicians, Actors, Writers, etc. were paid to create, research, produce, perform. The WPA sponsored indigenous, regional talent and encouraged the growth of national artistic culture.

Federal Art Project - posters, murals, paintings

- over 200,000 art pieces were created for public places like schools, libraries, and post offices
- posters (early graphic design) were created to support the New Deal



Federal Music Project - concerts, classes, composer forums, music festivals, research in regional music (Appalachia, Creole, Negro, cowboy, etc.)



Federal Writers Project - provided work for historians, teachers, librarians. They were to work American Guides - focusing on the scenic, historical, cultural, and economic resources of the United States. The writers traveled to different regions, did research, conducted interviews, and wrote about the broad American culture. This project grew to include many other writing projects.



Movies and the Golden Age of Hollywood

- Silent stars did not make transition well (with exception of Charlie Chaplin)
- First Drive-in theatre opened in New Jersey during 1930s
- Movie theaters popped up in every town. Movies were an escape from the struggles of the Depression
- 80 million Americans went to the movies once or more per week
