***Canterbury Tales*, “The Prologue” by Chaucer (due Co-op #4 – September 29)**

Vocabulary – add to terms section of your notebook

Iambic Pentameter (blank verse): a metrical line composed of five iambic feet (light stress followed by a heavy stress)

Couplet: a rhyming pattern in which the first line rhymes with the second, the third with the fourth, and so on: *aa bb cc*

Elision: In poetry, the dropping or slurring of a syllable to keep close to the meter of the poem

Chaucer can be read in any modern translation but if reading is done in the Middle English (Norton), these suggestions can help:

- *Read aloud – the sound of the Middle English will often resemble Modern English even if spelling doesn't.

- *Norton uses tiny font – use an index card to go line by line, then you don't lose your place when glancing at footnotes.
